Develop overall body-strength, balance, co-ordination and agility. - Write correctly formed letters - Negotiate space and obstacles safely, with consideration for themselves and others; - Use cutlery effectively at meal times - Further develop the skills they need to manage the school day successfully: lining up and queuing • mealtimes 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Recognise and use single letter sounds and at least 10 digraphs. - Read tricky words. - Read simple phrases and sentences made up of words with known letter-sound correspondences and, where necessary, tricky words. - Form lower-case and capital letters correctly. - Write short sentences with words with known sound-letter correspondences using a capital letter and full stop. - Demonstrate understanding of what has been read to them by retelling stories and narratives using their own words and recently introduced vocabulary;

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Understand and say one more/one less - Count beyond 10 and then 20. - Explore the composition of numbers to 10 e.g. using tens frames, conceptual subitising, partitioning and recombining sets in games, finding double with dice. - Automatically recall number bonds for numbers 0–5 and some to 10. - Teach children to solve a range of jigsaws of increasing challenge. - Compose and decompose shapes so that children recognise a shape can have other shapes within it, just as numbers can. - Compare length, weight and capacity using the correct vocabulary. - Name 3D shapes and their properties. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Comment on images of familiar situations in the past e.g. homes/ schools/ transport - Compare and contrast characters from stories, including figures from the past. - Recognise that people have different beliefs and celebrate special times in different ways. - Explore the natural world around them/ Spring. Understand the effect of changing seasons on the natural world around them. - Describe what they see, hear and feel whilst outside – ice/ melting and change of state. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Sing in a group or on their own, increasingly matching the pitch and following the melody. - Listen attentively, move to and talk about music, expressing their feelings and responses. - Encourage children to notice features in the natural world. Help them to define colours, shapes, texture and smells in their own words.
